## Dotty's Amazing Dad

Since I shared memories of my mother last month, I felt it was only fair to give my father equal time. My father was truly an amazing man. How many people have a father in his 90's who falls in the snow, then decides to make a snow angel before he gets up?

Growing up in the 50's and 60's, I remember on Saturday nights my dad would have a bowl of popcorn, one bottle of beer, and settle into his chair to watch *Gun Smoke*. He was the man who taught me how to ride a bike and how to bait a hook. If I was going to go fishing with him, I had to learn to pick up the worms – ugh! But before long, I was going out after rain storms to dig up night crawlers.

When I was a junior in high school, my dad bought me an old Plymouth and taught me how to check the oil. Before I drove anywhere, though, I had to tell him the exact streets I was going on. No matter which route I told him, He would say, "That's the most dangerous street in Canton." Then it dawned on me that no matter what street I took he thought it was the most dangerous street in Canton because I was driving on it! It was just my dad's way of telling me to be careful.

My parent's wedding anniversary was September 9 and almost every year on that date, my dad would be up in Canada fishing with a group of his buddies. Both my parents told me it was their annual break from each other so they could make it through another year. It must have worked because they were married for 71 years. I remember somebody asking my dad how long he'd been married and his answer was, "All my life!"

They say the best gift a father can give his children is to love their mother. How very true! Those 71 years were not just a marriage, but a continuing love affair. From the time my mother went to live at Hennis and my father moved in with me, he visited her twice a day without fail. If we happened to go out for lunch, we HAD to be back by 1:00 pm. One time I mentioned that if he skipped an afternoon, mommy wouldn't even realize it. His loving reply was, "It doesn't make any difference if she doesn't know, I'd know it."

I can't even imagine how heart-breaking those hours must have been for him – being with the person you built a lifetime of memories with and knowing she couldn't remember any of them. I remember one night when he came home, I asked him how mommy was. He said, "We spent the whole night looking for her husband. Damn guy never did show up."

Did I mention that my dad had a great sense of humor? My brother, who is a fisherman like my dad was, was casting one time and snagged what he thought was a good size fish because it was so heavy. Turns out it was a sock filled with sand! So, for Christmas that year my father gave my brother a mounted "Sock Fish" made from an old tube sock.

My father taught me many things like when you see a ball roll into the street, slow down because there will be a kid right behind it; and when you walk out of a room, turn out the lights because he just worked at the Ohio Power, he didn't own it. However, I think the most important thing I learned from him was to accept a gift in the manner in which it is given.

Growing up we never went without, but I do know that my parents lived from paycheck to paycheck. Later, however, my dad was able to make some good investments. He was a very generous man and delighted in surprising me with unexpected gifts. At first it made me very uncomfortable. I would tell him that I didn't want his money and the closeness we shared meant more to me than anything money could buy. Then it was pointed out to me that refusing his gifts hurt his heart more than the loss of money hurt his wallet. Of course, some gifts I really didn't want like the wall lamp he put above my desk to surprise me. It was so ugly and the only tactful thing I could think to say was, "You really shouldn't have." Well, my dad's been gone 6 years now and that ugly lamp is still hanging on the wall because it was a gift of love.

Living with your father when you are an adult is much different than living with your daddy when you are a child (I mean, who knew he snored so loudly). There were a lot of adjustments on both our parts, but I truly treasure those years. We were no longer just father and daughter, we were friends. How lucky my children and grandchildren were to have known him.

To be perfectly honest, even as old as I am, there are nights when I can't sleep because there is no snoring and tears roll down my cheeks because I miss my mommy and daddy. How blessed I am to have had them in my life as long as I did. This Father's Day be sure to thank God for the blessing of your Father.

Yes, that time of the year is coming. The end of May brings the end of school and summer adventures. Some of us have kids in our lives who are going to be thrilled to walk out the door of school on that very last day. Some of us are teachers (or have been) and think that perhaps we are a bit more excited than those kids. And from what I have heard of the past school year, teachers may have the edge there.

At the end of the 2020-21 school year, there are groups of young people who are walking out of the halls of their high schools for the last time. They are the seniors, and they are mostly thrilled, a bit nervous and maybe sad to leave the place that has brought them to their next big steps.

It has been over 50 years since I was one of those seniors. But I remember what a blur those last days were. Finals and cleaning out lockers and Baccalaureate and Graduation practice and Graduation and cake and ice cream on the front porch with my family and going to parties and promising to remain friends forever. I remember being sad to leave the high school and a bit frightened by the prospect of college.

When I graduated, girls mostly became nurses, teachers, secretaries, store clerks or moms. Early on I was sure I wanted to be a nurse because my mom was. But after some serious talks with her, I chose teaching.

Lots of us were going to go to “the Branch”, Kent State Tuscarawas Campus. I really wanted to go to main campus, but four kids and not hefty salaries from Mom and Dad and not able to get much financial aid because my parents made just a little too much money kept me close to home. I would be at Tusc. Kent for at least two years. I actually stretched it to three years by doing some of my classes that third year at Stark Kent. Plus, Kent offered a very comprehensive teacher education program at the branch campuses. I did attend classes at main campus for two quarters my senior year. But I did get a great education in those smaller classes at home and met some pretty wonderful people there.

Now skip ahead four years and I am graduating from college and leaving my beloved Kent State Campus. Then came sending out dozens of letters to school districts and applying for teaching positions. Everyday after working for the playground system, I raced home to see if any superintendents wanted me to be part of their district. Not until August did someone want me. Indian Valley called me and requested an interview. I was not even sure where Indian Valley was and had to ask how to get to Tuscarawas for my interview. I made it to the interview, thought I did not do such a bad job and drove home to wait. I was offered the job the next day and I took it.

I spent 35 years teaching mostly fourth grade students in both the Tuscarawas and Midvale buildings. I had a wonderful career there making even more friends and working with so many great children. I retired in 2008. And I was a bit nervous.

Those teachers who were retiring before me used to tell me that I would know when it was time to retire. And you know, I did. At year 34, I knew that year 35 would be my last. I knew that for a certainty. I had worked in one district for all those years and now it was time to....what???? Worry about whether my retirement would be enough to sustain me. What would I do with all that time that was now my own? My good friends at school were not ready to retire yet.

And then came Gene Dummermuth with an offer to be Director of Christian Education here at St. John's. In July 2008, I started my job in the same office I am in now.

Why all this information about me? Because a couple days ago I read one of the Daily Devotions from the UCC.

Tony Robinson, a UCC minister says, "How often we mistake our present condition for final completion. We may think we have come to the end of our rope. With this God, there's more. Or maybe we think we are already at the pinnacle of enlightenment and achievement. Sorry, you're not all that. There's more. So much more."

I knew there was so much more after high school and college graduation. After retiring from 35 years of teaching, maybe not. But God thought differently and sent Gene to me.

I have done so much in these years. Youth Group and lock-ins and Homeless Awareness and XOO Kids. I have been to places I never could have imagined. Driving 15 passenger vans loaded with youth on mission trips, to youth events and Synods around the country. Spending lots of time at our Ohio church camps. Visiting El Salvador two years in a row with my dear friend Patrick. Traveling to Arizona and the southern border. Bouncing around the streets of Nogales, Mexico in the back of a converted ambulance. Ireland and Italy. Working for a week at Back Bay Mission in Mississippi and making wonderful new friends from Massachusetts. "There's more. So much more."

Tony continues, "Pastor John Robinson told the Pilgrims as they set sail from the Netherlands, 'There is yet more truth and light to break forth from God's Holy Word.' Ron Buford reframed that for us as 'God is still speaking.' There's more. God gets the last word."

To those young people graduating this year, I wish you the best. Know this, no matter what path you follow, there is always more. Open your hearts to what can be and remember, God does get the last word. Thanks be to God.



## St. John's UCC Church Council Meeting May 11, 2021 at 7:30 pm via Zoom

The meeting of St. John's United Church of Christ Church Council was called to order on May 11, 2021 at 7:30pm by President Dan Dummermuth. There were 15 members in attendance including Rev. Dunkle and Pastor Dotty.

Rev. Dunkle offered an opening prayer.

The minutes of the April 2021 meeting were approved as emailed to council members.

Treasurer Dave Gingrich gave the treasurer's report. General Fund income for April was \$27,640 and expenses were \$39,986 resulting in a shortfall of \$10,041 for the month. General Fund Income year-to-date is \$88,461 with Expenses year-to-date of \$131,705 resulting in a year-to-date shortfall of \$43,244. M/S/C by Rob Gump and Mark Perry to approve the treasurer's report. Dave also reported that the church received a second PPP Federal Stimulus Loan for \$62,525. This money will be used for continuation of payroll expenses. In April, we spent \$14,620 toward the floor tile replacement project. This is the cost for materials only. The \$320 received from Lenten Offering was donated the Dover/New Philadelphia Food Pantry.

### SENIOR MINISTER REPORT

Rev. Dunkle reported the 9am parking lot service is 50% of the Sunday attendance and the 10:30am in person sanctuary service is 50%. The past Sunday had 71 online viewers. Rev. Dunkle recorded 24 one call devotions.

A custodial candidate will be in-

terviewed this week.

The church has received sixteen applications for the position of St. John's Preschool Director. Interviews are being scheduled.

The tile work replacement has started.

### PASTOR OF VISITATION REPORT

The Home Touch Ministry packets are being sent to 50 church members. Pastor Dotty is also sending birthday cards to church members and has conducted several in home visits. In-person Bible Study has resumed and will continue throughout the summer.

### DIRECTOR OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

MARK PERRY REPORT- A bid for the corner building project has been accepted and renovation is moving forward.

ELDERS REPORT- Vicki Rufener reported the Elders met and reviewed plans for Scholarship and Graduation Sunday. Memorial Sunday will be observed on October 31.

DEACONS REPORT- Beth Showers and Sally McCombs reported the Deacons have secured ushers May through July.

### TRUSTEES REPORT

Rob Gump reported One Stop Flooring corrected the carpet in the Fellowship Hall. The water damage in the Bell Choir Room is the result of missing roof shingles due to wind damage. An insurance claim has been submitted. Two repair estimates were re-

ceived. M/S/C by Mark Perry and Vicki Rufener to accept the \$18,850 estimate from Miller Roofing. Any expense after insurance coverage, will come from the Capital Improvement Endowment Fund. The wall damage repair will be completed in the future.

Investment Committee- The Investment Committee met with the financial advisor on April 27<sup>th</sup>. There is \$2,350,000 in investments and it has earned about 7%. Scholarships in the amount of 5% of the dollars in the Scholarship Fund can be awarded each year. This year nearly \$21,000 was available. M/S/C by Dave Gingrich and Sue Ferbrache to award \$13,500 in St. John's Scholarships for 2021.

## St. John's Annex Building


**COMING SOON!!** St. John's Contemporary Worship & Community Center. The long-awaited renovations to the former Lehman Cycle building have started, with a planned completion date of August 2021.

Following the congregational approval to fund the renovation project, Church Council has approved entering into a contract with Benchmark Construction of New Philadelphia as the General Contractor for the project. Benchmark had the winning bid for construction and will be utilizing several local subcontractors for the work to be completed.

As we discussed a few months ago, we will be making significant upgrades to the infrastructure to accommodate the use for "public assembly" ... this is the technical term for worship/group meetings. The Ohio Building Code for this type of facility is different than the regulations for retail space, which is how the building has been used in the past. We will be upgrading the electrical service, adding new restrooms, improving the HVAC system, installing new flooring, and adding a new "fresh" appearance to the building.

Would you like to help support this new facility adjacent to the main church building? We will be accepting donations toward the project, and in addition to the renovations we will need furnishings of tables, chairs, sound system, etc. Your contributions could be designated toward some of the furnishings or to sponsor a part of the renovation. Perhaps you would like to cover the cost of a table & chairs; or possibly fund the cost of the new entry doors. The possibilities are nearly endless, as we will be spending approximately \$300,000 for the project.

Thank you for your support and we will keep you updated on the progress.


