When the bomb went off on a road near Baghdad, Hilbert Caesar thought his life was over. What he discovered was...it was just beginning. According to *The Washington Post* (November 25, 2005), Army Staff Sergeant Caesar was in charge of a long range 155mm howitzer—a self-propelled gun that resembles a tank. He was out on patrol in Iraq when a roadside bomb exploded. When the smoke cleared, Caesar looked down and saw that his right leg was severed in three places. He thought to himself, “Oh man. This is it. My life is over.” But he didn’t die. The insurgents responsible for the attack disappeared, and Caesar was transported to safety. At Walter Reed his missing limb was replaced with an artificial leg of plastic and steel. Still he felt despair about his future. He was in pain and was worried that he’d never be able to run again or be attractive to women. But little by little he began to shift focus. Caesar met other injured soldiers and heard them talk about their recoveries. He began to look for the best and realized that he was fortunate to make it back from battle with just one missing limb. Caesar now completes marathons in racing wheelchairs and has found a job with the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs. He sees the loss of his leg as a setback and believes that he has come out of the war with more wisdom, compassion and appreciation for life.

The same thing happened to the apostle Paul after he was stabbed with a “thorn” in the flesh. We don’t know exactly what this thorn was; although biblical scholars have suggested that it could have been anything from epilepsy to stuttering, depression to eye problems. What’s important is that Paul considered this affliction to be a painful trap or torture designed to take him out of the spiritual battle plan. Three times he pleaded with the Lord to remove the thorn, but God said to him, “My grace is sufficient for you, for power is made perfect in weakness” (II Cor. 12:9). Power is made perfect in weakness. As amputee Hilbert Caesar says, “it makes me appreciate life a whole lot more”.

Think of a time when you have experienced spiritual growth. A shift in priorities. Have these improvements been the result of smooth sailing? Spiritual growth comes from stress, struggle and suffering. We have been dealing with the pandemic for 8 long months of suffering and pain. I





Then Jesus asked, "Were not ten made clean? But the other nine, where are they? Was none of them found to return and give praise to God except this foreigner?"

Luke 17: 17-18

At a recent sparsely attended youth group meeting, I asked the youth there, questions about being back to school in whatever form that has taken. How was it different from when their school lives were upended in March, and seemingly, no one was really sure how to do school in this new way? On being part of on-line school in the spring, responses dealt with it being hard and not liking to "talk to the teachers". Apparently, some youth don't remember talking to teachers face to face. One of the youth is doing on-line school now full time. Her response was that school is more stressful now than it was in the beginning. She also said that there are lots of assignments; maybe more than face-to-face youth get. They also told me that they missed friends when they were all on-line and if you asked a teacher a question, sometimes, you had to wait for an answer longer than if you were in a physical classroom.

I have many friends who are teaching right now. I am grateful I am retired. Teaching today sounds very stressful and things seem to change on a weekly basis as new issues arise. But they are doing the best they can considering the circumstances. And I think many people need to remember that. The teachers are doing what they are told to do by someone above them. It is stressful times for teachers and administrators as well as parents and youth and kids.

But in this month when we celebrate those things we are grateful for, the education in this country continues in all its many forms and configurations. We are doing a new thing, and we need to be grateful that we can do it.

What are the youth group members thankful for? That one gets to play football with his team. That one is grateful for music because it helped get her through the quarantine. And that one is grateful for his family because they helped him get through the quarantine with their support.

There is a story in the Bible...from Luke. It is the accounting of the time when ten sick men asked Jesus to heal them and he did. The men were so thrilled that they were healed they quickly moved on to show the priests how they had been healed as Jesus had told them to do. However, one of the men turned back and fell to the ground thanking and

praising Jesus for making him well. Did you know the tenth man who came back was a Samaritan? Remember that the Samaritans were looked down on by the Jewish society of the time. And we don't often realize that the one who thanked Jesus was Samaritan.

As the story continued, Jesus questioned why the other nine had not come back to give thanks. In one account, Jesus asks, "No one returned to praise God except this foreigner?" He adds to the Samaritan, "Get up and go. Your faith has healed you." Jesus realized that foreigners have a strong faith also.

So what are you thankful for this November? In this difficult time, sometimes it seems we have not much to be thankful for. But if we really look at our lives where we are right now, we have so many things to be thankful for. We are called to be grateful to God all the time, not on just one day at one meal. So give thanks to God on Thanksgiving this year for all that has been given to us. But don't stop there.

I would suggest that the youth, and all of us, find something each day in our lives to thank God for. We just might be surprised.



St. John's United Church Of Christ Church Council Meeting October 13, 2020 at 7:00 pm via Zoom

The meeting of St. John's United Church of Christ Church Council was called to order on October 13, 2020 at 7:05 pm by President Dan Dummermuth. There were 17 members in attendance including Rev. Dunkle and Pastor Dotty.

Rev. Dunkle offered an opening prayer.

The minutes of the September meeting were approved as corrected.

Treasurer Dave Gingrich gave the treasurer's report. General Fund income for September was \$18,127 and expenses were \$29,507 resulting in a loss of \$11,379 for the month. M/S/C by Doug Peterman and Clyde Penrod to approve the treasurer's report.

SENIOR MINISTER REPORT

Rev. Dunkle reported he continues to make daily One Call devotions and record on-line worship services. He officiated the funeral of Martha Lengler. The parking lot services have had 35-45 cars weekly. We will continue these outdoor services in October, weather permitting. The office staff is back to regular hours. Confirmation class photos were taken on September 20th. Confirmation Sunday will be November 1st with final plans still being considered.

PASTOR OF VISITATION REPORT

Pastor Dotty reported that twenty Operation Christmas Child boxes have been returned to the church. The week of November 16th will be final collection. Friday, November 13th will start the "Keeping America Warm, One Scarf at a Time" project. Members can donate scarves and gloves to be placed outside on a clothesline for those in need. She also mentioned the Elders, Advent Lantern Project to honor long time members of the church.

DIRECTOR OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Belinda Lentz continues to record weekly children's sermons and make daily XOO post on Facebook. Website resources include Sunday School lessons, a scripture and activities. She is researching advent ideas. Belinda and Heather Smith have created a congregation and community scavenger hunt to be held on October 25th from 2-4pm. Participants will text or call Belinda and Heather to register. Everyone will meet at the church for directions and clues. When the hunt is complete, they will return to the church for goodie bags. It should be a wonderful time for all. The soup, sandwich and dessert lunch served 33 and raised \$1,159. Thank you for your donations.

They would like for the plans to be completed by November 15th so it can be presented to the congregation. If approved, construction will take place over the winter and the building will be ready to go in the spring.






