In other words, be a good steward of you. Love yourself as God has loved you. Yes, give yourself permission to do this. Forgive yourself as Christ has forgiven you. Yes, give yourself permission to do this. Let go of the past. It doesn't exist anymore. Be free to live this moment and this New Year, alive and filled with vitality. Accept nothing less.

Let us affirm this now before January 1, 2021, finds us again saying, "Happy New Year" and "Where did the year go?"

Does Your Table Need To Be Tossed?

According to Matthew's Gospel, between His triumphant entry into Jerusalem and when He was arrested, Jesus made His way to the temple. Here's where the trouble begins.

The temple's outer courtyard had become a beehive of business and busyness. It was ringed with money-changers; men who made a living charging visitors to convert their foreign currencies for that which was only acceptable as a temple gift. They also sold animals for sacrifice. No doubt, many were convinced they were performing service for the temple. If they charged more than they should, or skimmed a little too much for themselves, or sold a blemished animal now and then, no one was the wiser.

But then Jesus showed up. He not only overturned their tables, He whipped and chased them out of the courtyard, calling them "a den of thieves." They were shocked, stunned, outraged. Why? Because no one had ever called them out on their behavior before.

But every now and then, we all need our tables overturned. Like the money changers, we begin with the best of intentions. We work so hard to maintain our tables, to present ourselves to the world seated behind displays of decorum, community leadership, competence, and righteousness.

Then comes that crazy command that we must love our enemies, that we must give without expecting anything in return, that we must forgive not once or twice, but seventy times seven. If we say "care for the poor," but demonize them, our tables are going to get tossed by Luke 16: 19. If our call for morality is nothing more than an attack on others, we'd better duck. Our tables are going to get flipped by Matthew 7: 3. We're taken aback when our table is demolished; when our commitments and sacrifices don't impress God, or attract the credit we think they deserve.

Jesus' act of vandalism was the last straw for people who had a vested interest in maintaining the status quo. No zealot was going to be allowed to change how things had always been done. They had no way of understanding the world would never again be the same.



“When he entered the house, the blind men came to him; and Jesus said to them, ‘Do you believe that I am able to do this?’ They said to him, ‘Yes, Lord.’ Then he touched their eyes and said, ‘According to your faith let it be done to you.’” Matthew 9: 27-29

It has been one strange winter...again. Some days, like today, will be warm and sunny with beautiful blue skies. Tomorrow it will be a bit cooler and rainy. And by the end of the week, snow is in the forecast. Not a lot, but snow nonetheless. I don't even remember if I shoveled snow at all this winter. And this was the year I was going to purchase a snow blower to tackle the snow on my hilly driveway. I didn't buy one.

As I was looking over a devotional for Lent from 2017, I came upon a new word I learned then and forgot about until today. The word is "viriditas", and it was spoken quite often by the medieval abbess Hildegard of Bingen. "Viriditas" is the greening of things from the inside out as physical things respond to the Divine energy unleashed on the world. Now there's a definition for you.

The author of the devotion, Molly Baskette, noted that the trees where she lives in New England lack any foliage for six months of the year, half of her life also. And then, every spring, over a brief period of time, nature delivers her promise of new life. Flowers and leaf buds appear as if by magic. The landscape that had been so barren explodes with new life. Dead looking branches don't fall off trees, but become the home for the new growth and beauty. Warmth and sun and the correct amount of rain provide living beautiful visions. Sounds so much like Ohio. The change happens every year. And with faith we know that it will.

The blind men Jesus spoke to understood that Jesus had the power to restore their sight through the power of the one who sent him. By their immediate response of "Yes, Lord", Jesus understood their faith in him. It was a "viriditas" moment. For the blind men, their blindness had been one of those physical things the Abbess had spoken of. And then with the simple, "Yes, Lord", Jesus released the Divine energy to bring new life to the men. Simple and complete faith.

You know, we have some really amazing discussions in the Junior High/Senior High Sunday school class each week. Whether there are a handful of youth or just one, I learn so much of what is in the minds of these young people. I have been told re-

cently that one of these young people doesn't really like politics much, but she surely will be voting in November and has an opinion. Last Sunday I sat with one young man and had a great conversation about winds of change in the Bible story and in Mecca as they deal with a young woman rapper who is creating quite a stir with her video.

I listen in youth group, whether it is at a bowling alley or while tubing or sitting on couches in the youth room. The youth have ideas and opinions, and they also are blossoming, as are the flowers this year. It is a blessing to watch as each one of the youth grow and become a new person each year.

I love to spend time in conversation with the XOO kids, who also have some pretty determined ideas and yet are so little and naïve. These little ones can be very serious as we talk about our lessons and stories, and they have some really strong opinions. And in the next minute, they are giggly talking total nonsense.

Jesus performed a miracle with the blind men. The blind men had faith in Jesus. We do not have the powers of Jesus, but each and every one of us can be part of small miracles with our youth and children by listening to them, by sharing with them, by respecting them and by showing them great love and belief in their abilities. They have great faith in us. They have seen us as we go about our lives here at St. John's. These members are

listening to and watching us. Thank you all for your support of these "kids" over all the years. Perhaps we have been part of "viriditas" all along. Blessings,

St. John's United Church Of Christ Church Council Meeting March 10, 2020 7:30pm

The meeting of the St. John's United Church of Christ Church Council was held on March 10, 2020, at 7:30pm in the Fellowship Center. There were nineteen in attendance along with Reverend Dunkle and Pastor Dotty.

The meeting was called to order at 7pm by President, Dan Dummermuth.

The Lighting of the Christ Candle was by Reverend Dunkle and the opening meditation by Belinda Lentz who spoke on "Blessings" from the Cup of Our Life by Joyce Rupp.

The council was introduced and welcomed the new members. President Dummermuth reminded everyone that they have a mailbox in the office they need to check periodically and pick up items for the council meeting.

A council roster was passed for members to correct and update their contact information.

The February board meeting minutes were read silently and M/S/C by Austin Gump and Clyde Penrod to accept the minutes.

Treasurer Dave Gingrich, reported on the financial status of the church for the month of February. The General Fund income for the month was \$22,619 and expenses were \$35,327 resulting in a shortfall for the month of \$12,708. General Fund income year-to-date is \$43,323 and expenses year-to-date are \$67,298 resulting in a shortfall year to date of \$23,976. \$17,300 has been transferred from the Investment Fund to the General Fund checking account. M/S/C by Vicki Rufener and Sue Ferbrache to accept the Treasurer's Report.

Senior Minister Report- Reverend Dunkle reported Bob Burkhart passed away. The new website is up and running. Heather Smith created the website and will update it. Audio sermons and online giving are available. Check it out at: <https://www.doverstjohns.org/>

Four security cameras were installed in the church. They are located in the social hall, fellowship hall, sanctuary and parking lot. "You Are Under Surveillance" signs will be posted. The feed goes into the back office and Reverend Dunkle's phone. There may be more added in the future. The system can handle up to sixteen cameras.

Pastor of Visitation Dotty Hartzell, reported the Good Friday service on April 10th, 7pm will be a play "Overheard: Conversations by the Cross." Holy Humor Sunday will be April 19th. Jean Paddock updated the council that nursing home visitation may cease, due to the Coronavirus.

Christian Education Report was given by youth Austin Gump and Belinda Lentz. Thirteen youth and three adults participated in the annual tubing event at Snow Trails. Ten youth bowled at Boulevard Lanes on March 8th. XOO kids cleaned the wood surfaces in the sanctuary, made St. Patrick Day cards for homebound and nursing home members and continue to learn about different cultures with scripture and discussion. Crafts were created to match the stories. Belinda will be preparing for her trip to Back Bay, Mississippi.

The New Beginnings Report was given by Mark Perry. He reported on the use of the building for outreach programs. Benchmark Construction and Matt Kinsey Electrical may be involved in the renovations. There was discussion on different types of services and possible further trainings.

The Elder Report was given by Clyde Penrod. April and May are busy months. He reviewed the Sunday service schedule for the upcoming months. The Church Council has the Lenten Dinner on March 18th. The donation list was passed and members were asked to arrive by 5pm to help.

Beth Showers reported on behalf of the Deacons. She passed a communion server signup sheet for the first Sunday in April (11 needed), Easter Sunday Service at 8am (9 needed) and 10:30am. (11 needed)

Trustee Report was given by John Deitrick. M/S/C by Clyde Penrod and Beth Showers to approve \$4243 for an ADH accessible door. Another door will be looked at for safety repairs.

Board of Christian Education report was given by Tara Lengler. *Continued on next page*

The February 23rd Marti Gras event raised \$400 for the Blessing Box. The board will serve the April 1st Lenten meal. The eggs are ready for the Easter Egg Hunt.

The Investment Committee report was given. M/S/C by Dave Gingerich and Dan Hurst to award up to \$19,022 in scholarships. M/S/C by Dave Gingerich and Clyde Penrod to transfer the investments from Morgan Stanley to Mid-Atlantic Fidelity. The investments will then remain with our current investment manager Kent Beal who moved from MS to MAF.

New Business- There was discussion about the Coronavirus and how it could impact our church. Should the church have a plan in place? Jean Paddock said Governor Dewine is being aggressive by minimizing large events hoping to reduce exposure to the virus. There is no directive to the general public but it is a matter of time. There is no guidance with churches yet. It was suggested to have hand washing (sanitizing) stations in the church.


