A friend of Tim's met up with him and he was carrying the singed backpack, and he told him how sorry he was that he lost everything; what a terrible tragedy he had faced. He smiled at the friend and with a look the man said he will never forget said, "No, mate! This was the best thing that could have happened to me! I lost all of my stuff, and for the first time in my life I am free! Thank God for the fire, now I can live like I am supposed to—focused only on God each and every day!" He said it with a gleam in his eye and a powerful, peaceful light that radiated from him, and he knew as crazy as he sounded, he was on to something. After they spent the day together he watched him walk off down the road with his singed backpack and sandals that were falling apart. Hearing this story, I could not help but think of another wise sage who wandered from town to town with no possessions, a close relationship with God, and a powerful peaceful light in his eye. May we practice letting go of our possessions, our egos and our desires for personal glory this Lenten season. May we heed the words of Jesus, Mary Oliver, and the man named Tim, wherever he may be. May we be free!

There is a video on YouTube that was part of the Middle School/High School Sunday school lesson the morning after the Homeless Awareness. If you get the chance, check it out. Pretty powerful stuff. The address is <https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=ZRCdORJiUGU>. It is a product of Google and is about heroes. It seems that last year one of the largest searches on Google was heroes. And if you watch you will find heroes of all kinds in that video.

Meanwhile, on the evening of February 1, ten youth and three adults came to the church to be part of the 14th Homeless Awareness Lock-out. It wasn't extremely cold, but it wasn't as warm as some nights. The temperature hovered at 33/34 degrees most of the night. I told the youth they could sleep outside if the temperature was above 30 and if they had plenty of blankets, sleeping bags and warm clothes. They came prepared. Box shelters were set up behind the stable on top of huge tarps. Excitedly, the youth put their sleeping gear in their boxes and gathered around Rob's

fire. Cars with offerings were met by youth, and some of our folks stopped by to visit. Loads of snacks covered the table in the Conference Room.

Kari McDade, from Pathway to Wellness...an outreach of the Homeless Shelter... stopped by and joined us around the fire. She had seen our post on Facebook, contacted me and volunteered to come to talk to our youth. She started by asking what questions the youth had. And they had many. She stayed with us for about ninety minutes talking. Of course, throughout that time we had a mix of snow and rain almost continuously. But no one moved.

Finally Kari asked who was cold and they all agreed they were. So were the adults. Kari left and the youth and adults went into the church for a bit of warmth and snacks.

When we finally went back outside, we walked downtown to look for places where homeless people could get out of the weather. Not many in our town, and the ones we found were very well lit. We took pictures and walked back to the church.

We had two families stop by that are friends of parents of two youth. The children of the families came, too. The kids of one family brought me \$10 in change and the other kids collected money at home and then bought canned food for the shelter.

People in our community saw our youth.

This year was a bit different than some of the rest. The youth were a bit subdued. We had watched a video the Sunday before about homelessness and then with Kari's discussion, I think our youth had lots on their minds. I know I did.

Wishes do come true. Emily Gump is a senior this year and has "never gotten to sleep outside". This year was her year. I mean, they all wanted to, but Mother Nature with that rain/snow mix, did in some of the boxes covered in more tarps. In the end, four youth and Rob slept outside all night. The rest stayed inside on the hard floor of the CE Building. Heather and I were up all night (haven't done that for many years). It was a long night, but sort of a thoughtful night. Plus I did take one of the boys home because he got sick. Emily couldn't sleep and came in to chat. I think Heather and I were waiting for one of the girls to come in, but she stuck it out. And then by the time we might have closed our eyes, it was time to start breakfast. Like I said, a long night, but a different night.

So back to that video; some of the heroes were the ones we see in the movies. Some were firemen and policemen and military. But some were dads and little kids and some had been Facebook posts. I had watched the video prior to Saturday night. As I sat there in the wee hours of the night, I

realized that I was in the presence of heroes. Sleeping heroes, but heroes nonetheless. The Homeless Awareness participants so look forward to this night. It is not for everyone; not everybody wants to participate. But the ones that do participate touch so many lives. And they don't even realize it. They sit out in the cold or burrow in a box or spread out on the cold floor to bring attention to the plight of many who have no home. Yes, they get to go home to a warm cozy bed and a shower and plenty of food. But for one night, they experience cold and wet and hard. And you see them as they straggle into church smelling of wood smoke, barely able to keep their eyes open. But you see them and you know what they have done.

Who are my heroes? The youth and adults of the past 14 years who have been a part of this event. They make me proud and make my heart swell with gratitude and love and a tear or two.

(As an added note, we collected \$320 on Saturday night and some supplies for the shelter. By Monday morning, I was able to send the Homeless Shelter checks in the amount of \$850. And I filled my car with many supplies that I delivered

to the shelter. Again, you all have surpassed my expectations. I also was able to send another large check later in the week from the luncheon sponsored by the Good Will Committee. Again my heart swells with the generosity I find in our church and the pride I have being a member here.
