I say "no kidding" because not everyone thinks of Lent as a welcome experience. This is probably because for years, the focus of Lent was on self-denial, on "giving something up." I am one that usually gives something up every year. I generally give up all sweets and bread for Lent and will do the same this year. Though the first few weeks of Lent are really tough as I go through chocolate withdrawal, it gets easier. But sacrifice? Why would I say welcome to Lent?

I do it because for me this is a devotion to God and is real, and for me, giving up sweets and bread helps me examine my commitment to Christ and meditate on the suffering and death of our Lord.

Acts of self-denial are appropriate when the sacrifice connects with Christian commitment. But there is another view of Lent: a time to prepare to celebrate the Resurrection. When we prepare to celebrate something, we often do housekeeping chores. If we are going to have a party at our house, we first spend some time cleaning the house. We lay in a supply of refreshments. We decorate. And when all is ready and the guests arrive, we celebrate. Preparing is never quite as much fun as celebrating, but it takes the preparation to make the celebration possible.

At St. John's Church, our Lenten opportunities for spiritual housecleaning will include: attending Sunday morning parking lot services or on-line services. Attending Ash Wednesday Service at 6:30 on February 17, in the parking lot to receive Ashes and begin your Lenten journey. As I write this, my Lenten "One Call Devotionals" are being prepared for March. For you, maybe you will send a card to a nursing home every day to bring someone cheer. Maybe you will read your Bible an extra half hour each morning. Whether giving up or giving in


If there was ever a time for sowing seeds of peace, joy, love, harmony, justice, community, and reconciliation, and the Kingdom of God among us, it is NOW.

## Feed My Sheep



Have you ever heard of the Commodity Supplemental Food Program (CSFP)? I never had, but come to find out it is a very important outreach program carried out

by some of the members of St. John's U.C.C.

The CSFP is under the umbrella of the Tuscarawas County Food Bank, however, it is a separate entity. To qualify for this program, you

- 1) must be a resident of Tuscarawas County
- 2) must be 60 years or older
- 3) must have a monthly income of \$1,380 or less.

On the first Wednesday of every month, boxes containing 30 pounds of food are delivered to our local food bank from Akron.

The volunteers from St. John's pick up 50 boxes every month and deliver them to recipients at Franklin Terrace in Strasburg, Seton Square in Dover, and individual residences in Dover and New Philadelphia. These are individuals who have been told by their doctors that for some reason they should not go out to pick up their own boxes.

The coordinator for the drivers from our church is Millie Page. She is assisted by Bob Feutz, Dave Gingrich, Bill Schilling, Barb Lengler, Jen Conkle, Bev Smith, and Belinda Lentz. A big "thank you" to them for representing St. John's as they show God's love by feeding the hungry.



My favorite daily calendar posted this on February 3...*"sometimes...it's not about the destination...it's about everything that happens along the way"*.

When I was a fourth grade teacher and then retired, one of my greatest joys was to see how my students had grown and what had become of them. There are teachers and lawyers and doctors and mechanics and farmers and loving parents and ministers and chemists and artists and on and on. Some I never learned about. And some have sadly passed. And life goes on.

There have been youth who have been part of youth group that have gone on to college and jobs and their life. Some days one of them is honored for who she is and what she has accomplished in her chosen profession. And on the 13 of February, Rev. Kim Deitrick Nagy will be hon-

ored with a new award given by The Association of the United Church Educators (AUCE). At the 50th anniversary of AUCE, Kim will be presented with the New Shoots Award, an award that "recognizes her for being a passionate innovative faith formation practitioner".

Kim is a child of this church, St. John's UCC, Dover. She grew up in this church. She went to Sunday school here. She was in Youth Group. She helped me while in college with both Youth Group and XOO Kids. Personally, Kim is like a daughter to me. We have shared much time and learning together. I was honored when she asked me to bring the message at her ordination. I am as proud of her as I can be.

And apparently, so is the Heartland Conference (the formerly known Ohio Conference). In their weekly newsletter, it was written...

*This year, AUCE's 50th, they are honoring one of Heartland's own with the first ever New Shoots Award.*

*Rev. Nagy has been not only an AUCE member, but also a vocal participant in their regional offshoot, the Great Lakes Association of United Church Educators, GLAUCE (also referred to by the shorthand, "glaw-see"). About being a nimble innovator in faith formation, she says, "Networks are key. Being part of AUCE and GLAUCE has been foundational. The networks have formed me for ministry. This award is for all of us in the networks; everyone has encouraged me to try new things." Indeed, she credits online gatherings of educators and faith formation lay leaders and authorized ministers over this last year as a source of near constant new ideas and novel ways of carrying on with robust faith formation practices. This strange season is a boon, she says, because these leaders have been "forced to be innovative in a way that we've talked about for years" due to pandemic restrictions.*

*And what innovation has this time of social distancing encouraged? "It's built relationships that are more intimate with the families we serve and has*

made us consider how we are resourcing these families,” Rev. Nagy said. “I think we are in a new reformation now.” The highlights of this faith formation (perhaps church-wide) reformation, she says, are the realization that faith formation is happening at home as well as at church, that we need to have accessibility woven into the work we do forming people in faith, that virtual is not only an option in desperate times, and that adults and children both crave faith formation tools.

Rev. Nagy’s colleague, Rev. Amy Gopp, the senior pastor at the Kent UCC, appreciates Rev. Nagy’s spark, “Kim is that rare combination of heart and head. Her creativity is rivaled only by her kindness and compassion. Beloved by our children, youth, young adults, families, and seniors alike, Rev. Kim Nagy embodies her faith and humbly guides others to do the same. She is a true servant of God.” Rev. Nagy says about her work, “I love watching the light bulbs go on.”

High praise for one of our own.

By the time you read this, Kim will have been honored by her fellow educators. She continues to work for her destination; she has many years in her future. (I believe that in our lives we have many destinations.) I am certain, knowing Kim, that she will enjoy and appreciate everything that happens along the way. She has so far. Keep her in your thoughts and hearts. She loves what she does and has used those “everythings” that have happened along her way to shape her and guide her. Blessings, Kim.

## St. John's Congregational Meeting For January 24, 2021

The St. John's United Church of Christ Congregational Annual Meeting was called to order on January 24th, 2021 at 10:23am by President Dan Dummermuth. The meeting was held in the church parking lot.

Those present were presented with a hard copy annual report.

First on the agenda was the Church Council election. President Dan Dummermuth, thanked the current and outgoing council members. He also thanked the nominees for agreeing to run. M/S/C by Dan Dummermuth and Mark Perry to accept the ballot. All nominees were elected unanimously.

Second on the agenda was voting on the corner building renovation plan. Mark Perry spoke in support of the plan. Opening a community center for

activities and adding a contemporary church service would encourage involvement of young families and new members. Mark asked for support of this project.

Dave Gingrich reviewed the financial commitment of the renovation. This project would be paid for by investment monies, donations, pledges and additional contributions. Dave also discussed in detail the renovation plan. There would be no loan for this project.

M/S/C by Mark Perry and Dave Gingrich to accept the ballot for the plan and funding of \$300,000 for the project. Ballots were passed out to those in attendance. According to the church constitution, voting could take place for one week.

The meeting was adjourned.

(Reported at the February 9, 2021 Church Council meeting the official vote on the renovation project was 56 yes votes and 7 no votes)

## St. John's UCC Church Council Meeting February 9, 2021 at 7:30 pm via Zoom

The meeting of St. John's United Church of Christ Church Council was called to order on February 9th, 2021 at 7:30 pm by Vice-President Laura Brown. There were 18 members in attendance including Rev. Dunkle and Pastor Dotty.

Rev. Dunkle offered an opening prayer.

The minutes of the January 2021 meeting were approved as presented.

Treasurer Dave Gingrich gave the treasurer's report. General Fund income for January was \$21,900 and expenses were \$31,803 resulting in a shortfall of \$9,903 for the month. General Fund Income year-to-date is \$21,900 with Expenses year-to-date of \$31,803 resulting in a year-to-date shortfall of \$9,903. M/S/C by Sue Ferbrache and Clyde Penrod to approve the treasurer's report.

Dave also presented a very informative member contribution range report from 2016 to 2020.

### SENIOR MINISTER REPORT

Rev. Dunkle had Dave Gingrich discuss stipend payments for Heather Smith and Glen Bleininger. Heather has been taking the lead role for recording and distributing the remote services and Glen has covered additional responsibilities since we have not filled the lead custodian position. M/S/C Dave Gingrich and Reverend Dunkle to give each a \$500 stipend.

The parking lot services are going well.

February 17th, 6:30 pm will be a drive-in Ash Wednesday service.

Reverend Dunkle announced the retirement of St. John's Preschool Director, Cindy Bowsher. Cindy has served in this position for 25 years. The position will be advertised in the next Carillon.

The Blessing Box has caught on with other churches and organizations, in our community.

Belinda Lentz continues to record weekly children's sermons and make daily XOO post on Facebook. Belinda is working on Lenten bags for the children. Belinda reported that Kim Dietrich Nagy, pastor of Kent United Church of Christ will be receiving the Association of United Church Educators, Sprout Award for enthusiastic excellence in her position.

**ELDER'S REPORT**

Clyde Penrod has folders ready for the new Elders on the council.

The Bible School supplies have to be taken from the storage unit and moved to the annex. The Nativity also needs to be moved to the annex. Members volunteered to do this.

**MARK PERRY REPORT**

Mark reported that the committee met and are ready to get started on the corner building.

The Boy Scout Spaghetti Dinner

will be held on Sunday, February 14<sup>th</sup> from 11:30am-1:30pm. It will be drive-in curb side pickup.

**TRUSTEE'S REPORT**

Doug Peterman and the trustees met and discussed replacement of the ceramic tile in the needed areas of the church. They will be giving the council tile options and prices at the next meeting. There are dollars in the church Maintenance Fund that could be used.

**DEACON'S REPORT**

Beth Showers reported the Deacons will be getting together to discuss upcoming responsibilities.

**COMMITTEE /TASK FORCE  
REPORTS**

Nominating Committee – President Dan Dummermuth reported we are still in need of a trustee.

Scholarship Committee- Chairman Sue Ferbrache stated that scholarship applications will be submitted online. Hard copy transcripts and recommendation letters will be sent to the church. M/S/C by Sue Ferbrache and Dan Dummermuth to approve the following Scholarship Task Force members: Sue Ferbrache, Carol Huprich, Barb Lengler, Jen Conkle, Eilene Johnson and first alternate Sally McCombs.

Finance Committee – Dave Gingrich reported that most likely the first \$62,500 PPP Loan will be forgiven. There will be an opportunity to apply for a second PPP Loan in the near future.

**OLD BUSINESS**

Congregational Annual Meeting- At the Congregational Annual Meeting on January 24<sup>th</sup> and for seven days after, church members had the opportunity to vote on the corner building renovation plan. The proposed plan passed with a 56 yes vote and 7 no vote. All candidates for church council were elected unanimously.

Corner Building Renovations- The committee has met with the architect firm. Final plans and permitting will be next on the agenda.

**NEW BUSINESS**

There was discussion on formulating proposed restart guideline plan to reopen the church for in person activities. The timeline is still in question, but the council would like to be proactive in planning. Those serving on this committee are Council President Dan Dummermuth, Trustee Doug Peterman, Elder Jean Paddock, Deacon Beth Showers and Reverend Tom Dunkle. They will use the Tuscarawas County Health Department as a resource.

Reverend Dunkle led the council in the Lord's Prayer and the meeting was adjourned at 8:45 pm.
