We refuse to cave to fear, remembering always how "perfect love casts out fear" (1 John 4:18) "and death has no sting" (1 Cor. 15:55).

CHRISTIANITY TODAY OFFERS THE FOLLOWING TIPS FOR CHURCHES

Trust God: Viral disease is a fact of biological existence and part of creation. Keeping perspective and not panicking apply here, just as they do for all risks we face as creatures in a finite world. No matter how dire circumstances get, the Lord remains our refuge and strength, "an ever-present help in trouble" (Ps. 46:1). To trust in the Lord amid trouble is to experience and bear witness to the power of Christ.

Pray: We must pray for the sick and the scared, for public health officials, for doctors and nurses, for researchers, and for caregivers. As Christians, we believe prayer has power, so we seek help from the Lord.

Heal the Sick: A core calling for Christians is to care for the sick and dying (Matt. 10:8), at times at the risk of our own lives (John 15:13). This is the epitome of love. Even if a virus outbreak prevents us from gathering as congregations to worship, we still support one another in our caregiving. This can happen through prayer, through verbal encouragement, and through coming alongside others to provide help in a crisis. Please bare with us as we navigate faithfully through this tough time. We are prayerfully considering your safety as we look for alternative forms of worship. We miss you, we love you, and we continue to stay connected as the Body of Christ.

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Our Rightful Inheritance

Once upon a time there were five sisters Mahlah, Noah, Hoglah, Milcal, and Tirzah. They were the daughters of Zelophahad whose story is "hidden" in Numbers 27 and 36, tucked in a story about the end of the forty-year wilderness journey of the Israelites to the Promised Land.

Israelites had left Egypt and were near the plains of Jericho when God said to Moses and Eleazar: *We have to get ready for entering the promised land. Take a census of the whole community, count them ALL from the age 20 years and older, so that we can divide up the land between them justly.*

The counting of the whole community commenced, but not really. The census was to count males over 20 years of age who were old enough to bear arms. The women and children were not to be counted.

The sisters had no brothers. What were they to do? Were they to remain landless and homeless? They found this to be unjust and decided to do something about it.

So they marched before Moses, in public, in front of the whole congregation, and made their case – *Why should our father's name be lost because he had no sons? Give to us our rightful inheritance!*

Moses was speechless! What could he say? How could he respond? Besides, how is it possible to change years of tradition and law, social order and structure?

Moses brings this complicated question to God and God says – *The daughters of Zelophahad are right. Give them their rightful inheritance. Give them what's their father's. And from now on there is a new law – if a man dies and has no sons, then you shall give his inheritance to his daughters.*

The law is amended because these women had the courage to speak out and demand what's rightfully theirs. They wanted to be counted. They wanted justice. Moses was not so sure, but God took the side of the women, the marginalized, the uncounted!

Because of their courage to speak the truth, God changed the law expanding women's economic status, hence culture, and society.

I think of this story as I watch the protests for equality, respect, and human dignity. My heart breaks for the racism experienced daily by those who are born with darker pigment in their skin. I find hope in the throngs of people gathered demanding

change. I celebrate that God loves all yet stands especially with those who are dismissed by society, those toward whom society remains indifferent, those who are uncared, demeaned, and degraded, even murdered.

Human dignity is a rightful inheritance for God's children created in God's image. Inheritance is passed on through bloodline. As God's children of all colors we all inherit the right to live with dignity, respect, and nobility. This right is a birthright, a gift. Begrudging another their birthright is violence demonstrated in racism, classism, homophobia, and all the "isms" that demean, belittle, and oppress.

May we continue to have the courage to learn about racism, to accept our part in it, and speaking truth to power and ensure that all God's children of all colors inherit their birthright now!

ST. JOHN'S UNITED CHURCH OF CHRIST CHURCH COUNCIL MEETING JULY 6, 2020 7:00 PM via Zoom

The meeting of St. John's United Church of Christ was called to order on July 6, 2020 at 7:00 pm via Zoom by President Dan Dummermuth. There were 13 members in attendance including Rev. Dunkle and Pastor Dotty.

Rev. Dunkle offered an opening prayer.

The minutes of the June meeting were e-mailed to board members.

Treasurer Dave Gingrich gave an informal verbal report. There is currently \$26,006.55 in the General Fund account including monies from the PPP loan fund. Giving by congregation members has been fluctuating up and down.

Senior Minister Report

Rev. Dunkle reported that he is continuing to make daily One Calls to members as well as record weekly worship services. Heather Smith continues to put in a lot of time to assist the church in that recording process and post our material online. Dan Dummermuth made the motion, seconded by Dan Hurst, to compensate Heather with an additional \$500.00. Motion passed. There are no hospital visits at this time.

Rev. Dunkle reported that the Goodwill Committee is sponsoring a tree at the Warther's Christmas Tree Festival and is collecting donations of only religious themed ornaments. There will be a curbside sub sale on July 29th with proceeds benefitting our local police departments. Kelly Hall is looking into lighting the Nativity in the building window next door for Christmas in July, as well as additional ideas to give the community a positive boost.

The Constitution Committee will meet July 13th.

Discussion was held regarding the return to in-person worship. Due to increased numbers of Covid 19 cases currently, including some from a local church, the decision was made to postpone at least until the beginning of August. The timeline will be revisited at next month's meeting depending on conditions at that time. The possibility of an outside worship service on the lawn is being investigated for later in July instead. Rev. Dunkle will keep congregation members informed by One Calls. Laurie Hall recommended that whatever direction we take, we need to have a way of recording those present at any service in case of any potential need to notify persons to self-quarantine.

Church Council Meeting, continued

Rev. Dunkle made a motion that the church purchase a fogger for cleaning and sanitizing our facilities in addition to the protocols already being put in place. This would include an electric sprayer and solution for approximately \$1,350. Discussion was held including Rev. Tom's input from Geib funeral services who are currently using such a system to disinfect large areas in about 10 minutes time. Whenever groups return to our buildings, including the Pre-K, we will need to have a way of maintaining them. Motion was seconded by Beth Showers and passed.

Pastor of Visitation Report

Pastor Dotty reported that she continues to send out birthday and thinking of you cards and conduct weekly Zoom sessions for Women's Bible Study.

Director of Christian Education Report

Belinda Lentz reported that she delivered Sunday School attendance and teacher appreciation awards as well as Bibles to third graders. Flock served 30 lunches that afternoon and will continue to do so on Mondays through August 17th. She gave thanks for all those who continue to support the Blessing Box ministry. A mini Bible School curriculum has been prepared with 3 days of activities called "Jesus Brings S'More Joy" and is available for families.

FLOCK (Free Lunch for Christ's Kids)

Once again, St. John's will be providing free brown bag lunches for children and adults in the church neighborhood and beyond beginning **Monday, July 6**. We will continue each **Monday** through **August 17 from 11:00am through 1:00pm**. Due to these very strange times we are living in, our program is just a bit different this year. We did not provide lunches last month as Dover Schools were providing food for all students in June. I learned that food would not be passed out in July or August. So back to the front yard we go on Mondays.

We will be packaging lunches on Monday mornings before we serve. Each lunch will include a sandwich, carrots or some other veggie, applesauce, jello or pudding cup, chips, granola bar, cookies or fruit. All lunches will be stapled and put into coolers. We will set up a table with turkey sandwich bags on one end and ham sandwich bags on the other. Water will be in the middle and folks can get as many bags and water as they need to put into provided plastic bags. We are only allowing four of us to package lunches and be outside, at a distance from the table to answer questions or help if needed. And of course, we will be masked and gloved for the entire time.

The Dover City School State Report Card once again showed us that the number of economically disadvantaged students in all our schools has not dropped since last year. The need is still there, and we will be out there helping feed those in need this summer.

We are doing a good thing here. Thank you for prayers as we provide for those in need.
